RESPECT THE OFFICE

Our Parshah introduces another set of dreams, this time dreamed by Pharoah. Pharoah woke up in a fright, and summoned all of his advisors, asking them to explain the meaning of his dreams. None of the explanations sufficed, and Pharoah was forced to seek additional counsel.

At this point, the cupbearer informed Pharoah of a prisoner who had a talent for explaining dreams. Without a moment to lose, Pharoah had Yosef pulled out of prison and standing in front of Pharoah.¹ There is something larger than Pharoah's personal needs, and that is the kingship.

In the dizzying speed that catapults Yosef from lowly prisoner to second-in-command we might overlook one small detail. The *Passuk* records that before Yosef was taken in front of Pharoah, Yosef was given a haircut and a change of clothing. In the normal course of events, this would not be surprising - anyone would dress up properly before meeting a king. However, this was not a normal situation. The *Medrash*² states that the dreams had agitated Pharoah so deeply that he was on the verge of death! These were no ordinary dreams, and only their true meaning would bring peace to Pharoah.

With this background, it now becomes harder to understand the need for a new haircut. True, Yosef probably did not look presentable, but the king needed him, and needed him now! The haircut could wait!

The *Medrash*³ explains that while it is true Pharoah needed him, it nevertheless would be a terrible affront to stand before a king while not properly attired. Pharoah himself, despite his desperation, was willing to wait until Yosef had tidied up, and was presentable. There is something larger than Pharoah's personal needs, and that is the kingship. Yes, Pharoah the person needed Yosef. But Pharoah the king needed Yosef to be dignified.

The *Ralbag*⁴ applies this to our daily lives. Every day we have the opportunity to speak to the King of Kings. We stand before Him when we pray, knowing the He is in front of us, listening to our prayers. When we stand before Him, the *Ralbag* says, we should not look disheveled or sloppy. By having the proper deference to Hashem during *Tefillah*, we will be able to bring our *Tefillos* to another level.

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Mind the Gap -Taking the Next Step

This section is usually focused on finding ways to practically apply ideas that we find in the *Parshah*. By implementing the exercises in our lives, we are able to grow in a particular area. This week, however, we already find a practical idea in the *Parshah*. However, it would be prudent to explore the benefits of this idea.

Besides looking presentable, is there any value in tidying up before *Tefillah*? There certainly is! If we accustom ourselves to taking a moment before *Tefillah* to tuck our shirts in, brush the dirt off, and wash our hands, we will start to really feel that Hashem is right in front of us, and that we are about to have a conversation with our Creator.

It is a special feeling to know that Hashem is interested in our life, but we often don't take the necessary time to reflect on this. By taking the few moments needed to prepare to *Tefillah*, we are doing an action that tells ourselves, "This is real! Hashem is right here in front me of me!" Not only will this augment our *Tefillah*, but it will enhance our overall relationship with Hashem.
