Again and again, against all sense and intelligence, Pharoah refuses to release the Jewish nation from captivity, and suffers the unpleasant consequences. point? Why not just gather everyone, and leave!

The *Pasuk*³ explains "...so that you may relate in the ears of your son and your son's son that I made a mockery of Egypt and My sign that I placed among them - that you may know that I am Hashem." We see that the purpose of this lengthy series of *Makkos* was so that *Klal Yisrael* should

The *Alter* points out something fascinating. Although the *Bnei Yisrael* already trusted Hashem,⁴ through the *Makkos* the *Bnei Yisrael* saw the specific and targeted personal intervention of the Almighty Creator into their very lives. During *Choshech*, when a Jew and an Egyptian were in a room, the Jew had light, while it was dark for the Egyptian.⁵ During *Arbeh*, the grasshoppers ate around the Jewish owned trees.⁶

Hashem does not use auto-pilot. At all moments Hashem is constantly involved in the macro and micro parts of our lives. He ensures that I have air to breathe, food to eat, water to drink, clothing to wear, and live in climates that have manageably controlled temperatures. He constantly makes sure gravity works so that I don't float off the Earth. He is present in the many complex systems in my body that run smoothly every minute of the day. He is present each time I cross the street, ride in a car or fly on a plane, when cooking or baking (even when the food gets burned), or when I go shopping. Hashem's involvement is not conceptual, it is real, and that idea is integral to our *Avodas Hashem*.
